What do you do at Outset and how do you support our clients?

Since joining Outset as Financial Controller in 2013 the business need has changed and evolved leading my role to do the same and I now hold the position of Director of Group Finance. Give us a brief timeline of your career so far

Following A Levels and a fortuitous conversation in the sixth form common room I commenced on a graduate training programme within an accountancy practice, studying first for AAT followed by ACCA. Whilst in practice I was responsible for auditing and preparing statutory accounts and tax returns, gaining experience of a large number of industries all of different shapes and sizes. What has been your biggest challenge in your role?

At varying degrees I get to be involved in a number of elements of the business sometimes that's after the event or more appealingly it's before and I can contribute to any resulting decision, this suits my inquisitive (some might say nosey) nature and also makes me feel valued.
