Meet the team

Neha Iqbal

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What do you do at Outset and how do you support our clients?

I am a paralegal in the Corporate and Commercial team where I assist on business transactions. My duties primarily consist of supporting the team in the post completion process, ensuring that post-completion requirements are met for example updating company registers. However, I also assist the team throughout different stages of a transaction to support the progression of projects and ensure that client objectives are met successfully and in a timely manner. These duties range from supporting the due diligence process and project management by updating completion agendas and project trackers and liaising with the team and colleagues in other departments.

Give us a brief timeline of your career so far

In July 2020, I graduated from the University of Kent with a First in Law. During this time, I conducted work experience with Outset which led me to returning back in January 2021 as a paralegal. At the moment, I have nearly completed my post-graduate studies at The University of Law where I am studying the LPC LLM as I aspire to qualify as a solicitor. Due to this ambition, a lot of my previous work experience has been tailored to this path, for example I have worked in a variety of legal roles within courts, law firms, law clinics and even with the police as a Special Constable.
